Teacher Burnout Is Crippling Our Schools

The real crisis? We are losing the heart of education: **the teachers**. Our teachers are burning out and quitting, and fewer young people want to step into their shoes. As a country, we have many unhappy teachers. In 2007, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company surveyed to determine the number of teachers who were "very satisfied" with their jobs, which was **62%**. Merrimack College revived the survey in 2023. The result? Only **12%** of teachers are 'very satisfied' with their jobs.

During 2020's remote learning, many parents grew to appreciate teachers' hard work. However, the pandemic intensified issues like low pay, lack of support, and rising student aggression, leading to teacher shortages. Many educators now tolerate daily disrespect, with administrators hesitant to act due to legal fears. As teachers quit and vacancies remain, students face less attention, fewer learning opportunities, and falling behind. Until classrooms are "cleaned up," teaching will remain an unattractive career. But what if we could change this?
